forging on in empowering the youths to realize their potentials.

Your help enabled us to have internet connection at the Centre. We are still appealing to our various Inwelle Friends to keep on believing in our projects and supporting us so that we can execute even greater projects in 2010. 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

CENTRE VISION: We envision a world in which indigent women and youths can go to a centre and find it equipped to aid them in their academic task as well as equip them with skills to earn livable wages. Thus Inwelle Centre is equipped with a library, reading rooms, and computer rooms. The Centre also engages in activities that will encourage older scholars to return and mentor budding scholars. Inwelle Centre, Enugu, is just a start, for with time, other Centres will be created in other underserved areas of the country. We at the Centre believe that empowering the youths will ensure the youths' ability to compete favorably in the global village and their being equipped to refrain from indulging in nefarious activities that riddle the society.

CENTRE MISSION: The main mission of the Centre is to empower indigent women and youths to become active participants in defining their future. The Centre seeks to accomplish this by making educational resources such as books, computer networked research rooms, reading rooms furnished with tables and chairs, and word processing facility available to these people at the lowest cost possible.

The Centre also designs skills acquisition projects for youths. The issues we wish to address are lack of educational resources for youths, especially females, and the ability for these youths to lift themselves out of poverty. Our activities are focused on strategies that will change the way these youths view acquisition of educational resources and financing their education, as it eliminates some of the obstacles that stand in their way of acquiring educational resources.

The Centre also helps in alleviating poverty by giving these students skills for sustaining themselves while seeking education. The Centre will train these youths to be computer literate-word processing, surfing the net—to give them skills for working part time either on their own or for some businesses and banks, and learning how to search for information on the net for writing their academic papers. As time goes by, the centre will also embark on vocational skills acquisition for these youths. The Centre's top priorities in the next two years are to embark on computer mass literacy campaign and to design skills acquisition projects for the youths, especially indigent females.



Catch-them-Young Mass Computer Literacy Campaign Project 2009 Participants

The first quarter has been exciting . The program "Catch them Young" was completed in February. This is a project set out for girls of primary and secondary schools only. It is aimed at training them on how to make use of computer properly and to impart in them the requisite skills and knowledge to function effectively in the 21st century and also to receive educational counseling on how to pass their Exams and how to recognize opportunities and utilize them. They were also instructed on how to seize the rare opportunity being offered to them on a platter of gold by the president of the centre, Prof Christiana Okechukwu, whom out of the magnanimity of her heart decided to alleviate the difficulties they faced by assisting them to get remedial education.

The project began with the Program officer, Mr. Nwannebuike Okeke and the Administrative Assistant Miss Chizoba Ofoegbu creating awareness among area schools. Initially, most of the schools thought that the project was not real because they could not believe that anybody in Enugu could just register 20 young people free and train them in computer usage. But after further explanations about the premier focus of ISRC, they became enthusiastic. The staff also went to houses to create awareness of the importance of computer knowledge in the ability for youths to participate in the 21st Century global village. Parents became enthusiastic and encouraged their young ones to register.

During their orientation, The Centre Manager, Mr. Onwuegbuzia, told the participants the mission of the Centre which is to empower indigent women and young people to realize their potentials and to be empowered to be able to earn livable wages by providing them with educational counseling and resources. He also told them the importance of being computer literate and the need to be serious with the program and conduct themselves properly and be focused. One of the participants Mercy Okafor noted that she did not know that such monumental resource centre exists here in Enugu. Another participant Chinasa Ekete asserted that she had learnt more just on orientation and promised to tell her peers about the centre and what they were missing by not participating in the program.

After the orientation Miss Chizoba Ofoegbu started lecturing them on computer appreciation; the definition of computer, types of computer, classifications of computer and component of computer. The children understood very well because they were taught computer theory in school. The young girls were general computer knowledge, word processing using MS. Word and keyboarding by the Centre staff and "Project Success" graduands.

Miss Chizoba Ofoegbu, one of the stars of 2007 Project Success group, educated them on the "the Right and Responsibility of Children to their parents and society under the Child Right Act of 2003, which was presented by Barrister. Margaret Nwagbo, Chairperson of FIDA, Anambra State Branch, during the 2008 annual symposium on Youth Education and Democracy. Miss Ofoegbu was able to explain to them the child right act which is a national law that makes provision for the rights of the child and acknowledges that a child has a right to express his/her opinion and have their opinions heard and acted upon. She also told them that

a child is a person who has not attained the age of 18years. She read out and explained to them the rights and responsibilities of a child and protection of the child right. And they were told that any child rights that were violated have its own penalty. She told them that every child has the right of survival and development. After that, the manager of ISRC Mr. Val Onwuegbusia talked to them on the topic: "Developing the minds of the youth for the future". He advised them to prepare their mind for future developing and to work hard as Prof Christiana Okechukwu who equally was not born with a silver spoon in her mouth but with hard work achieved her aim. They were told in other for them to become active participant in the society and in their future they should pay attention to their teacher in the class, go through what they have learnt for the day, do their assignment and keep away from bad friends. Then I toured the different sections of the well equipped library and marvelled at the abundance of books which were neatly arranged on the many book stands that adorned the quiet reading rooms.



SECURITY

We got our VSAT. Thank you Global Fund Fo Women and Inwelle Friends.

August 2009 was a landmark for Inwelle Centre. Global Fund for Women supported the Centre 's efforts to install VSAT for fast internet access to the Centre. The Centre was able to realize \$3,200.00 from the Fund raising Dinner Dance in June. Our supporters turned out in numbers. Give three happy cheers to Global Funds and our Inwelle Friendship supporters Heep! HeepI! Heep!!! Hurrah!!! We have continued to apply to other funding institutions. We had to scale down on the VSAT with the hope of upgrading as we get more funding. Instead of C.Band, we acquired Ku.Band. Instead of a dedicated Bandwidth, we acquired the lowest level of shared Bandwidth. The result is that we are forced to connect not more than 8 computers at a time ,else will run the risk of operating on extremely slow paced internet surfing experience. We are also finding it difficult to pay for the monthly Bandwith cost. Hopefully, someone or some organizations will come to our aid to enable us keep the Centre internet running.



the social ethos. Our third annual symposium which is on the theme of Preventing and Coping With Teenage Pregnancy in the 21st Century Nigeria is the springboard for our next year projects.

The papers for the symposium centred on the issue of teenage pregnancy, its effect on the girl, the boy/man that got the teenager pregnant, the parents of both parties, and the community. Many young indigent girls transitioning from adolescence to adulthood are vulnerable to early marriage with its propensity to violence against them because of societal prescriptions or sometimes because of the circumstances of their birth.

Once indigent girls get pregnant, the next thing is to pressure them into marriage, not counting the cost. After such marriage, these young girls endure untold hardships, emotional trauma, humiliation, and even death while trying to lift themselves out of poverty. Marrying off young girls that got pregnant is an age-old risky undertaking that is ingrained in

The goal of the symposium is to empower girls at a young age to avoid the trap of marrying early as a quick fix for avoiding the social stigma of having gotten pregnant and to educate them on issues surrounding teenage pregnancy. We provided a forum for exchanging ideas and identifying meaningful



ways to proactively address the problems of teenage pregnancy, using local resources. The papers presented addressed the issues facing those who got pregnant prematurely, those who are vulnerable to getting pregnant in their teen years, the parents and the entire community whose duty it is to nurture these girls and direct them in the path that will enable them shun the enticement that is the root cause of getting pregnant, and be psychologically and emotionally prepared to support teenage mothers and not force them into marriages, especially loveless marriages.

Since they can't go to school or join others in the society, they go out there to sell their bodies just to belong.

Organizing A Programme for The Poor Parents, Especially The Mothers: The topic of the program will focus on minimizing how they produce children. Some youths are are many in their family and since they are many, their parent can't afford to maintain them.

Knowing That We Are All Equal: We are equal in the eyes of God. The rich ones today do not allow their children to get married to the poor ones just because they think that the poor world is different from the rich world. If the rich is allowed to get married to the poor, life in general will improve for poor girls.

Being Able To Think:

The teenagers should learn to think before they get into situations that will lead them to become pregnant. Those that did not know should make friends with those that know or find a peer/mentor that will be encouraging them. Some teenagers have vision, ambition and target but the problem is how to realize their dream. If they find friends that know better than they or find a mentor that will help them to get to their target, the journey will be easier and faster.

Coping With Teenage Pregnancy

Organizing Programmes For Pregnant Teenagers:

If we organize a program for them, those that are pregnant will know that we still love them and care for them and will not abandon them. In this program, we should teach them how to start something doing in six to seven months after having heir baby.


