


WHAT WE DO

Inwelle Centre creates opportunities for marginalized women and youth, especially adolescent girls to get a second chance on education and acquire marketable skills that will enable them be employable or self-employable. The centre provides innovative, strategic, life-changing projects: Catch them-Young, Academic Boot Camp, Mass Computer Literacy Campaign, adult education, healthcare information, and Annual Symposium.

Our Incredible 10 Year Journey 2005—2015

It has been a 10 year ride. We have had our successes. We have had our setbacks. We are ready to forge on to a more exciting and more successful years ahead. From 2005 to 2015, we have created opportunities for 2,843 girls, women, boys and men because of our four-tier incredible innovative, strategic, life-changing programmes:

- Catch-them-young, an after school tutoring, for secondary school students, computer skills acquisition and counseling for the adolescent girls who dropped out of school and those at the risk of dropping out of school;
- Academic boot camp for indigent girls transitioning from high school to higher institutions, who are ill-prepared to gain admissions and possess no skill to generate income to be able to pay for the cost of higher learning.

- Mass computer skills acquisition for girls to have a reasonable means of employment other than jobs that yields below subsistence level of income; and
- Annual Symposium to re-orient the girls and to create awareness in their parents and community leaders on the need for education for marginalized girls as an effective means of poverty alleviation and combating violence against women.

Through these programmes, we have created opportunities for marginalized girls to get a second chance on education and acquire marketable skills that enabled them be employable or self-employable. Their training at Inwelle Centre causes a change in their mindset on how to develop themselves and ensure a bright future.

The first set our Boot camp girls we trained from 2008 to 2011 are graduating in such science and tech fields as Chemical Engineering, Computer Engineering, Bio-Chemistry, Micro-Biology and such social sciences as Social work, Economics, English, Mass Communication, and such human services fields as nursing, and social entrepreneurship. We have been able to give some of the girls international exposure which built up their self-esteem and heightened their aspiration. In March 2015, Inwelle Centre team of eight presented a panel on STEM education for indigent girls at Montgomery College Rockville, Maryland, USA as part of the College's work on its TIDES grant which focuses on STEM and cultural relevance and also presented a panel on the same topic at the 59th UN Commission on the Status of Women conference in New York. Ms. Philipa Mmadubuko, one of Inwelle Centre successes, presented on these panels. Philipa sums up the effectiveness of Inwelle Centre programme in leveraging young girls to achieve when she says, "Today, I can smartly control my PC, take care of my school work using the computer, send mails; in fact, I cannot forget to tell you that the first e-mail I had was opened at Inwelle Centre, Enugu State, Nigeria.

That I studied Biochemistry was from the teachings and changed mindset obtained from Inwelle Centre. The first time I saw my boot camp photo on Global Fund for Women IGNITE website, I thought that I had just reached a great height. However, that sky was just the beginning. My greatest exposure was the opportunity Inwelle Centre gave me to come to the 59th United Nations Commission on the Status of Women (UN CSW) conference and present at a panel on Making Careers in Science and Technology (STEM) Educational Path Culturally Relevant to Indigent Girls in Remote Villages in Nigeria. I never knew that going to Inwelle Centre boot camp could lead to my going to the U.S. and stepping into the United Nations. Now, I am the envy of my peers and a role model for some other girls." We have been able to embark on STEM education for indigent girls in remote villages successfully.

Our Academic Boot Camp is a one month boot camp during which we focus on encouraging girls to embrace life in the fields of science and technology, especially the lucrative field of hi-tech computer. Among the participants, we most often had 16 girls and 4 boys from five states in the southeast geopolitical zone of Nigeria. The participants were housed and fed at Inwelle Centre premises. They were taught Mathematics, English, Physics, Chemistry, Biology. They also taught each other academic subjects that they

were strong in. They held folktale sessions in the evening and discussed social issues woven around these tales. They were taught landscaping at the boot Camp. They actually planted flowering trees at the Boot camp site. They




were lectured on the importance of landscaping and tree planting to help the environment. They fetched their own firewood and water and cooked their own food. They learned how to shelve books, keep record, and assist users with using the internet.

From 2012 to 2014, Inwelle centre Academic Boot camp not only focused on quality STEM remedial classes for girls, it also taught skills in high level computer skills, especially in computer technician field. Ninety percent (90%) of our girls succeeded in their Senior Secondary Certificate Examination (S.S.C.E.), Joint Admission and Matriculation Board Examination (JAMB) and West African School Certificate (WAEC) Exams, became employable and earned money to pay for education. They were positioned to be able to actually make their own choices and not succumb to societal

and parental coercion and manipulation to get into early marriage. They have access to books and the internet, Monday through Saturday 8a.m. to 6 p.m. We held after school tutoring for young girls in especially Mathematics and Integrated Science in our Catch-them-Young project at the satellite Centres. On UNESCO literacy campaign day, Inwelle C entre distributed notebooks to young children, mostly young girls. Seventy-one (71) children participated.

We are becoming increasingly visible. Inwelle Centre was granted a Special Consultative status by United Nations Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) in 2014 and was made an accredited membership of United Nations Department of Public Information in November 2015. Inwelle Centre attended the UN DPI/NGO conference in 2015, and for 2016, we have registered a panel on Achieving the "SDGs through Global Partnerships: Girls in Africa Extending the Boundaries of Education, Technology, and Girl Power" and hope to bring the solar project team to the 2016 UN CSW conference.

Philipa mmadubuko is leading the Inwelle Centre—Purdue University Solar project from the Inwelle Centre angle. The ultimate result of our partnership initiatives is a global partnership addressing SDGs in Africa through technology, for grassroots girls' and indigent youth's STEM education to



create a sustainable, replicable model based on Inwelle Study and Resource Centre experience which we hope will be shared throughout Africa to help African girls and indigent youth attain their maximum potential as leaders and entrepreneurs. Inwelle Centre lacks consistent electric power and internet stability - key factors in the technological divide. Inwelle Centre girls (who have been supported by Global Fund for Women to succeed in different fields of science and technology) are collaboratively learning together with Purdue University engineering students how to use internet, video and virtual reality technology remotely as they work together on installing 20 kW solar panels to enable key educational equipment to be consistently operational at the Center in Nigeria. This is a really great beam of international light on Inwelle Centre.

Inwelle Centre has established four (4) satellite centres Ozalla Ezimo, Udenu Local Government; Inyi Enugu Ezike, Igboeze Local Government Area, both in Enugu State, Ogidi, Idemili Local Government Area; Ozubulu, Ekwusigo Local Government Area, both in Anambra State. In 2014, Inwelle Centre was able to break the barriers that chained indigent girls and cause them to lead circumscribed life at Ozubulu, one of our satellite centres. For the first time, our annual symposium was held in Ozubulu to reach more stakeholders. Ozubulu has a serious case of not investing in their girls. They marry them off early because of the high bride price young girls attract as against older educated girls. The symposium provided the platform for creating awareness among community leaders on the need to invest in the girls instead of marrying them off at tender age and exposing them to violence. The parents were also made aware of the dangers of pushing their children into an early marriage. It also enabled the Centre to advocate to the community on the ills of coercing girls into early marriage, and exposing girls to assault and physical violence as hawkers, especially at busy trunk roads/ express roads. The discussion was engaging, informative, and well received. A girl from the village proudly displayed her S.S.C.E. result in which she made 9As after her participation at Inwelle Centre Academic Boot Camp. The audience was thrilled at her result and saw it as a sign of greater things to come among the girls in the village.

We have also indirectly benefited an estimated 4000 -5000 people, through our mass interviews and discussions on mass media such as our director's interview on Voice of America TV, Channel 4 news, Maryland, USA, Nigerian Television Authority news, and Enugu State Broadcasting TV 50 and the YouTube. We have been able to carry out exciting projects successfully. The first project was the Mass Computer Literacy Campaign that ran successfully from February to November each year. We extended free internet usage to Centre users. We trained youths free to be computer literate. But then, our gifts kept on giving to a huge number of people as those we trained have now been empowered to train others. We kept our library open to members of the public from 8a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday Through Saturday; as a result, the community was able to make use of our library and internet.

Also I will make Inwelle Centre work known to my friends and family by visiting them in face book, home; in fact, all my brothers and sisters will soon come for the computer training here in Inwelle Resource Centre. Thanks Prof. for giving us free training, free browsing, and free Library. May the good Lord bless you, all the days of your life. Without you, I am not sure that I would have been computer Literate today. I pray for God reward to you all. Below, are the packages I lent from the Centre: Introduction to computer, MS Widows, Keyboarding, MS Word and Internet.

MOVING FORWARD

By the year 2030, we hope to have contributed to the Agenda for Sustainable Development Goals and exhibit their relevance in Inwelle Study and Resource Centre's work to leverage young people to attain successful adulthood. There are 17 SDGs and 169 targets. Things that could impede their realization are insufficient funding, inappropriate allocation of funding, immediate needs truncating delayed gratification for a sustainable future. As we train the girls, they have immediate needs to satiate their hunger. Therefore, interim measures are constantly required. Hence we must continue to give quick skills that fetch income while we keep our eyes on the long term target. As we work to join in achieving sustainable goals, we also enjoin members of the global community to examine their roles in these three critical areas.

Partnerships: It is necessary that those working on this SDG recognize contexts. They should recognize the need for both partners to respect each other as both are building each other, therefore, are dependent on each other for the realization of their enterprise. It is a two-way street: a Global partnership becomes the way to go—over privileged group so that both will learn lessons in human upliftment while the under privileged group builds capacity to become less dependent.

The under privileged is no longer a pitcher which the privileged pour in whatever water it pleases for it to pour into the pitcher. The pitcher does not have the power to question the quality of the water—it is dormant and stationary. Therefore, it is necessary to have a needs analysis. No matter how well the rich partners mean, if they give an expensive magazine to someone who needs clothing or shelter from the elements, the gift becomes ineffective/ unnecessary. Development should no longer revolve around aid but around capacity building. It should equip the people to produce and to be self-reliant. Approach must be holistic – health, economic upliftment, and creating a conducing environment to thrive. SDG 4 which "Ensures inclusive and equitable quality education and promote life-long learning opportunities for all" eludes the Nigerian youth. Inwelle Centre sees quality for youth and women, especially adolescent girls as the bedrock of its programme.

UNESCO 2015 MDG Global Monitoring Report: Education for All 2000 – 2015 Achievements and challenge states that 58 million are out of school and 25 million out of these are in rural, lowincome regions. Inwelle Centre targets the rural and urban slum



where these out of school girls are found. We live in the reality of education that leaves the children either dropping out of school because of unfriendly school practices and unconducive school environment and those who are poor and are likely to forgo school because of hunger or those unable to perform successfully at school because hunger impedes subject matter comprehension and mastery or those who are graduating almost illiterates. We will continue to try to work to realize a fair, inclusive, equitable future = meeting the needs of these children since universal primary education does not ensure quality education for them. Unconducive environment, unmotivated teachers, lack of school materials, lack of time to even avail themselves of whatever spurious education free education promises, among others, keep being the monster staring at young indigent people in the rural communities

For us the three pillars of SDG 4 are Leveraging the girls, educating the local community, and causing a change in attitude, and partnering with local and international players who embrace education of the young. We will continue to battle with the issue of Quantity VS Quality in education, literacy and the role of education in building human capacity. The SDG talks about "education for sustainable development and sustainable lifestyle, human rights, gender equality, promotion of a culture of peace and non-violence, global citizenship, and appreciation of cultural diversity and of culture's contribution to sustainable development". We will continue to open the centres in hinterland to reach girls in remote places. Hopefully, by 2030 we will achieve our dream of 200 satellite centres.

However, we will continue to do what we do we which are teaching/tutoring after school, mainstreaming dropouts, imparting skills, encouraging self-development through learning, helping young people in basic reading skill, mathematics skill (the more people can read, write, and can add, the better job they get). Eradicating poverty in all its forms and dimensions, including extreme poverty, is the greatest global challenge and an indispensable requirement for sustainable development. We hope that our programme will help to meet this challenge.





Empowering Youth in the Twenty-first Century Nigeria By Prof. Christiana Okechukwu, Ph.D. Founding President and Chief Executive of Inwelle Study and Resource Centre, Enugu, Nigeria





When we are enabled to execute our programme, we believe that we all can watch the face of the future change in our communities, watch the human capacity map of the future shift. When inequality is reduced and developers are not treated as takers but partners and girls have unfettered access to education, quality education solidly anchored in access to science and technology, we can watch access to resources grow opportunity, especially when partnership is structured on a two-way street idea—each building the other's capacity. We will watch a holistic realization of the SDGs as quality education, gender equality, reduced inequality and global partnership intertwined with poverty reduction if not elimination, good health, renewable energy, peace and justice, good jobs and economic growth. "Change the way people think and things will never be the same again" (Cry Freedom). Inwelle Center has been supported in part by the Global Fund for Women and is an NGO accredited by the UN Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) and the United Nations Department of Public Information (UN DPI). We the trustees have, over the past ten years, impoverished ourselves as we dip into our meagre salaries and fund projects and sustain our daily activities. We hope that other big players on the international scene will look on us and help to support us.

The overall goal of Inwelle center in the years ahead is to contribute to the achievement of SDG goals 3-5. SDGs 3-5 deal with health for all, education for all and gender equality. It is our mission to utilise any fund extended to us to assist the people in the towns where our satellite centres are located and at the main Inwelle Centre Headquarter improve quality and dignity of life by applying the new technology of renewable energy (solar) we are working on installing to improve maternal health of rural women and girls. Thus Inwelle Center plans to accommodate a small health clinic for pregnant women, pregnant teenagers, and victims of GBV, especially and all girls and women in general who come into the Centre seeking assistance on sexual health and other health issues. Inwelle Centre is committed to guarantying broader life opportunities to girls and women, as well as carrying out youth programmes. Using education and computer skills acquisition to fight violence against girls is a great focus of Inwelle Centre which we will continue to work on. We need to upscale in more remote villages and reach more vulnerable girls. By the end of 2030, we aim to have built a Centre of excellence that will upscale and reach more vulnerable girls in remote villages. It is our hope that our friends and well-wishers will walk this great path with us. Like an African adage stipulates, when we walk with other people, we walk far. We need you all to support us to walk far. Thanks.

I was also able to educate them on the "the Right and Responsibility of Children to their parents and society under the Child Right Act of 2003, which was presented by Barrister Margaret Nwagbo, Chairperson of FIDA, Anambra State Branch, during the 2008 annual symposium on Youth Education and Democracy. I was able to explain to them the child right act which is a national law that makes provision for the rights of the child and acknowledges that a child has a right to express his/her opinion and have their opinions heard and acted upon. I also told them that a child is a person who has not

attained the age of 18 years. I read out and explained to them the rights and responsibilities of a child and protection of the child right. And I told them that any child rights that were violated have its own penalty. I told them that every child has the right of survival and development.
