Vision

Inwelle Study and Resource Centre envisions a world in which youths have unfettered resources to develop into successful adults. Our mission is to empower youths, especially adolescent girls, to have expanded personal choices, explore their potentials, and control their future so that we can close gender gaps and challenge actions which stunt girls' development.

Mission

- Inwelle Study and Resource Centre (ISRC) is a Nigerian NGO established in 2005. Its mission is to alleviate the difficulty faced by indigent youth, especially girls in remote villages and women who want to improve their lot, by assisting them to get the remedial education needed to enter a higher institution and by helping them acquire computer and job skills that will enable them to work and earn money to be able to pay for their education. In this way they become self-developers.
- ISRC forges partnerships with remote villages where it establishes satellite centres with 1000 books and two computers. We have so far established four satellite Centres.

What We Do

The centre provides four innovative, strategic, life-changing projects: Catch them-Young, Academic Boot Camp, Mass Computer Literacy Campaign, and Annual Symposium.

- We hold a symposium every year, selecting themes that are aimed at sensitizing the community to the problems faced by at-risk youths, especially indigent girls and young adult women, and seek solutions by engaging members of the community in discussion. We have reached 5,675 attendees in our 10 years of existence.
- Every August, for one month, Inwelle Centre houses and feeds a new group of 20 young girls and 4-5 boys from five states of the southeast geopolitical zone in Nigeria, totaling 182 girls and 36 boys trained by Inwelle Centre at its academic boot camp designed for indigent adolescent girls to enable them pass their exams into higher institutions and have the skills to earn money to pay for their education in higher institutions. Constantly, we register between 85% and 90% success in the girls entering higher institutions of learning.
- We leverage girls to embrace life in the field of science and technology, especially hi-tech computer technology. Some of our participants have just received their degrees in Chemical Engineering, Social Work, Computer Science, etc.
- We seek change of attitude of the society towards girls' effort to embrace life in the science and technology field by sensitizing parents and community leaders to support girls who show interest in acquiring skills in hi-tech computer fields.
- We help youths, especially adolescent girls, acquire marketable computer skills that will enable them to earn money to pay for their education in the fields of science and technology. Since 2008, we have trained 956 girls and 232 boys in our Mass Computer Literacy campaign.
- We leverage girls to compete favorably with their rich peers by the time they graduate from a higher institution so that they can find jobs.
- ♦ We have one of the richest libraries in the area.

Synopsis of the Year: Director's Message

The year 2016 has been an incredible year. We were funded twice—one to attend the 60th United Nations Commission on the Status of Women (UNCSW) conference in New York and to establish a Healthcare Information Clinic. Bravo to the Global fund for Women which has been supporting us since 2009. Your terrific work uplifting women all over the world is much appreciated.

For our organisation, capacity strength is a conceptual approach to social or personal development. We focus on understanding the obstacles that inhibit people from realizing their developmental goals while enhancing the abilities that will allow them to achieve measurable and sustainable results. Through our counseling, workshops/seminars, technology and healthcare Information trainings, our beneficiaries gained skills, competency and the ability to self-develop and to become capable of contributing to development of their families and their communities. Therefore, they can now overcome the causes of their exclusion and suffering. We are aware

that capacity building on individual level requires development of the conditions that allow the individuals to participate in their environment, to build and to enhance their acquired knowledge and skills. We, therefore, prepare them to accept change as an unavoidable factor, since some of them are required to stay out of





their homes and function in a totally different locality to participate in trainings and to learn skills. The girls, especially the ones who have been violated, are equipped to be able to assess habits that made them vulnerable and caused some of their mistakes, and by so doing, we empower them to aim for self-development as a means of sustainable development rather than embracing quick fixes that lead to exposure to violent situations. Most of the girls we empowered have become serious and have stayed focused. Some went back to school while others are focusing on further improving their computer skills to enable them become reasonably employed.

We were also able to validate that our holistic health, economic upliftment, and creating a conducing environment to thrive -- is an effective strategy. We were happy to learn that the SDG 4 "Ensure inclusive and equitable quality education and promote life-long learning opportunities for all" which has eluded the Nigerian rural dwelling indigent girls and which Inwelle Centre has been focusing on promoting, is a serious concern. Inwelle Centre sees the quality for youth and women, especially adolescent girls as the bedrock of its programme. For us the three pillars of SDG 4 are Leveraging the girls, Educating the local community and causing a change in attitude, and Partnering with local and international players who embrace education of the









In the next three years, we hope to focus on creating programme aimed at dismantling violence against women and girls by building the ca-



pacity of rural girls/women to improve quality and dignity of life, improve their chances of acquiring higher education and healthcare literacy. Hence, we will be embarking on our Maid Strong Project. Using prevention, empowerment and advocacy, we want to create a programme aimed at dismantling Violence against Women and Girls by making sure to keep our healthcare information clinic whose duty is to build the capacity of the nurses in rural communities and to give marketable and life skills to vulnerable girls/women as a way to empower them to be self-reliant and develop the ability to leave a violent relationship. Through our Computer literacy program, we want to continue to build the capacity of young people, especially adolescent girls in rural communities.

Inwelle Centre at The 60th UN CSW in New YORK, MARCH 2016

Five members of Inwelle Centre in collaboration with four members of Perdue University Engineering students presented at a panel Inwelle Centre registered at the 60th United

Nations Commission on the Status of Women (UN CSW) on the Theme of Sustainable Development and Women Empowerment. We presented on our panel titled: "Achieving the SDGs through Global Partnerships: Girls in Africa Extending the Boundaries of Education, Technology, and Girl Power." Three of the Inwelle Centre members were sponsored to

travel all the way from Nigeria to attend and present at the 60th United Nations Commission on the Status of Women in New York. First, the opportunity to present to an international audience built their confidence and skills. Philipa Mmadubuko, who was supported to attend and present in 2015 as well as in 2016, says: "My two week stay in the United States this March is indeed life enhancing for me. It was a lot of educational moments. The experience at the UN CSW was great; it gave me the opportunity to see a lot of women and girls sharing ideas and leading the advocacy for change, women empowerment, gender equality and sustainable development. It has given me the real picture of girl power and leading girls in remote communities to fire up in technology and the SDGs. I shall remain firm in the advocacy for inclusive values." Her sentiment is what Inwelle Centre programme's mission is about, enhancing the lives of girls and positioning indigent girls to achieve. The conference did just that for us in the lives of the three ladies we brought

Oluchukwu says "I was enriched with more information on the importance of girls going into STEM education. Moreover, achieving the SDGs through Global Partnerships, focused on promoting a better circumstance for girls and women to have a stand to defend themselves nationally and globally, not on-

ly defending themselves, but the skill they acquire will help them earn a better living. I really learnt a lot which I know will help me exhibit a better method of teaching since I am in the educational field. It is said that teaching a class is not all about the subject but teaching what will help the learner grow or develop mentally, physically, socially and otherwise.

Mrs. Joy Emone who became involved with Inwelle Centre as far back as 2001 before the forest which today houses Inwelle Centre was cleared to build the dream conceived by the founder, has this to say:

One of the most rewarding stories is the excitement between the Inwelle Centre Solar group, led by Philipa Mmadubuko and the Purdue University Engineering student solar group led by Kendall Kyle. These two groups had been working through VSEE and through Skype for six months. Coming to the 6oth UN CSW gave them the opportunity to meet in person and to share ideas.

We learned great lessons through this partnership. We learnt that global collaboration goes a long way to enhancing the work we do. It is necessary that those working on the SDGs recognize contexts. They should recognize the need for partners to respect each other as both are building each other, therefore, are dependent on each other for the realization of their enterprise. Partnership as a two-way street is the way to go—over privileged group learn lessons in human upliftment; the under privileged builds capacity to become less dependent.



As part of Ogidi Inwelle North America's (OINA) vision to move Ogidi forward, the team organized a medical outreach .The medical Mission took place at Ogidi General Hospital, Ogidi on 29thDecermber, 2016. The medical mission team from the United states of America was led by Dr. Nnaemeka Udoh and Engr. Uzo Ekume. Chief Nnaemeka Chukka, a physical therapist and one of the key functionaries of the mission invited Inwelle Study and Resource Centre to participate in the capacity building of the health personnel at Ogidi since we have been training some of these personnel at Inwelle Satellite Centre, Ogidi.

Inwelle Centre relationship with Nike Cottage Hospital was provided a platform for our Healthcare information clinic. Inwelle Centre Director spoke at one of the pre-natal clinics at the hospital with Inwelle Centre Physiologist in charge of the Centre's Healthcare information clinic. We participated at the Iji Nike Cottage Hospital's Activities on Maternal and Child health week (MNCHW) 2016. Maternal newborn and child health week is a bi-annual event in Nigeria. MNCHW week is celebrated twice yearly nationwide to strengthen maternal and child health care services and patronage at the grass roots level. The objectives are to improve the healthcare seeking behavior of the whole family, especially pregnant women and care-givers of under five children. 

INWELLE CENTRE HEALTH CARE INFORMATION CLINIC NURSES TRAINING ACTIVITIES

Thanks to the Global Fund for Women, we have been able to establish and run a health care information clinic for 12 months. Of all the activities we have had during the grant period, we are most proud of training the nurses and the police on how to map and counsel victims of Gender Based Violence. We are most delighted about these trainings because these two sectors have the first contact with the individuals who are violated in one way or the other. In these 12 months, 45 Nurses and health workers, 2 doctors, and 3 hospital administrators were trained in basic word processing, internet usage to prepare them for our future training on maintaining accurate record and possessing skills to enable them function effectively in this infor-



























INWELLE CENTRE SCHOOL OUTREACH ACTIVITIES

Adolescent girls and children in general are our major reason to be. But we very often create activities to catch at-risk girls young to mitigate problems they face as adolescents. Prevention! Prevention! We cannot over stress the impact of prevention and preempting in the goal to equip indigent girls to realize their potentials and live a fulfilled adult life.





Social vices like cultism, teenage pregnancies has been on increase in southern part of Nigeria. We tried to tackle that too. Habitual abusing of girls and women leads to poverty and low socio economic status of women. Inwelle Study and Resource Centre has held seminars for about 170 boys and men because they are the most perpetrators of domestic violence. They have been sensitized on the effect of violence on children's education and women socio-economic status. Indirectly, the trained men will help in curbing the menace in the society. We held a GBV awareness seminar with National Youth Service

Corps at Girls Secondary School Abakpa, Nike, Enugu State, reaching 567 students, 15 Youth Corp members and 50 Teachers. Another school based sensitization held at Community High School Emene reached a total population of 825 individuals,

both students and staff













Our annual symposium was successful. We held one at Ogidi in Idemili North Local Government Area of Anambra State and another at Inyi Enugu Ezike in Igboeze local Government area of Enugu State.Summary of the activities:

At Ogidi, Miss Oluchukwu Edogwo spoke on "Encouraging reading culture among the youth" while Mrs. Grace Edogwo spoke on the "Role of Exercise on Health. At both Ogidi and Inyi, Miss Chinelo Okoye spoke on the "Impact of Domestic Violence on Children." She enumerated the effect of domestics' violence on children, especially the social behavioral effects, which include cultism, anger, insomnia and accepting violence as normal way of life. She charged the fathers to help curb the menace in other to create greater tomorrow for the Children. Miss Philipa Mmadubuko also spoke on STEM, Mobile Phone Revolution, and Health. These two symposia were well attended as 144 young people came from Enugu, 187 Children, 44 youths, 40 older men and 56 older women, including the nurses at the health centres, turned out.





