The exciting 2008 has come and

gone. We had our successes. We had our setbacks. We are ready to forge on to a more exciting and more successful 2009. First we raised \$3,159.44 during our June 2008 Fundraising Dinner Dance. Also we were able to carry out exciting projects successfully. The first project was the Mass Computer Literacy Campaign that ran successfully from February to December 2008. We were able to train 87 youths. But then our gifts kept on giving to an estimated —number of people.

In August, we had a participatory session during which 20 secondary school teachers were trained with 13 youths. In November, the Centre employed Miss Chizoba Ofoegbu, one of our volunteers. Miss Ofoegbu was also one of our pioneer Project Success girls of 2007, who were trained in computer Appreciation, MS Windows, MS. Office as means of empowering them to fend for themselves while at school. Miss Ofoegbu developed an interest in

Message From The Founding President | Executive Director Computer Engineering after being exposed to Computer at the Centre through Project Success. She gained admission into a private University, Caritas University, to study Engineering. Because the tuition was beyond her limited resources, she was not able to continue.

She is being encouraged and couched to take the Government's Joint Admission and Matriculation exam in order to secure admission into a more affordable although competitive university. She is also being couched to save a portion of her salary for school tuition and materials. Our annual symposium took place on December 18, 2008 and was well attended. The theme for 2008 was Youth Education and Democracy.

 ${\it We}$ are yet to secure grants for our projects.

In 2008, we were one of the 347 semi-finalists for the prestigious Echoing Green grant in which up to 1,500 organizations worldwide applied. Kudos to Inwelle Centre Programmes. The grant was given to the first 20 organizations. We applied for the third time but received a notification from the Echoing Green in January, 2009 that we were no longer competitive. We have moved beyond the start up stage on which Echoing Green funding focuses. We have applied to other funding institutions and are awaiting the result of these applications. In spite of the economic crunch, we hope that 2009 will bring better news for the Centre. All in all, it has been a wonderful year, a year to look back on and smile at lessons learnt and jubilate for triumphs.

This piece will not be complete without my

acknowledging many people whose support and goodwill made the year what it was. CENTRE VISION: We envision a world in

which indigent women and youths can go to a centre and find it equipped to aid them in their academic task as well as equip them with skills to earn livable wages. Thus Inwelle Centre is equipped with a library, reading rooms, and computer rooms. The Centre also engages in activities that will encourage older scholars to return and mentor budding scholars. Inwelle Centre, Enugu, is just a start, for with time, other Centres will be created in other underserved areas of the country. We at the Centre believe that empowering the youths will ensure the youths' ability to compete favorably in the global village and their being equipped to refrain from indulging in nefarious activities that riddle the society.

CENTRE MISSION: The main mission of the

Centre is to empower indigent women and youths to become active participants in defining their future. The Centre seeks to accomplish this by making educational resources such as books, computer networked research rooms, reading rooms furnished with tables and chairs, and word processing facility available to these people at the lowest cost possible.

The Centre also designs skills acquisition projects for youths. The issues we wish to address are lack of educational resources for youths, especially females, and the ability for these youths to lift themselves out of poverty. Our activities are focused on strategies that will change the way these youths view acquisition of educational resources and financing their education, as it eliminates some of the obstacles that stand in their way of acquiring educational resources. it also helps in alleviating poverty by giving these students skills for sustaining themselves while seeking education. The Centre will train these youths to be computer literate—word processing, surfing the net-to give them skills for working part time either on their own or for some businesses and banks, and learning how to search for information on the net for writing their academic papers. As time goes by, the centre will also embark on vocational skills acquisition for these youths. The Centre's top priorities in the next two years are to embark on computer mass literacy campaign and to design skills acquisition projects for the youths, especially indigent females.





RESPONSES FROM THE PARTICIPANTS

GENERAL EXPERIENCE

The teachers who were drawn from Queens school Enugu, Described their experiences as wonderful, interesting, challenging, highly packed I.T skill sessions. The describe the Centre as marvelous, conducive for training, user friendly, welcoming. They described the instructors as knowledgeable, friendly, respectful, humble, skilled, and pleasant.

ENTRY LEVEL

Eighty percent of the participants described themselves as novices in the computer. Some said that they used to fear coming near the computer and never knew the extent of the resource capacity of the computer.

EXIT LEVEL

On exiting the training. most of the participants feel comfortable using the computer for simple tasks such as word processing using the Microsoft word and excel. In their own words, the following represent their exit level.

1. I can boldly approach a computer set and work with it without thinking that it will break or bite me. The computer has been demystified for me.

I am now aware of computer terms. I have skills in managing files.

CHALLENGES:

Some express the need for acquiring personal computers in order to be able to practice the skills they were taught. Some decried their prior inexperience in the computer as an impediment to maximizing the opportunity the training accorded them The training therefore, was tasking and demanding for novices.

- 1 REQUESTS/RECOMMENDATIONS
- 2 All the participants stressed the need to extend the training to more teachers who will then teach youths under their care and also be able to use the skill for grading and for generating educational materials. They all decried the absence of internet at the Centre. They stressed that to build their capacity and be in a positing to guide the youths to successful future they need to have access to the global village through the internet.

November, 2008, the Centre employed Miss Chizoba Ofoegbu who was one of our volunteers. Mis Ofoegbu was also one of our pioneer Project Success girls who were trained in computer Appreciation, MS Windows, MS. Office as means of empowering them to fend for themselves while at school. Miss Ofoebgu developed the interest in Computer Engineering after being exposed to Computer at the Centre through this project Success. She gained admission into a private University, Caritas University, to study Engineering. Because the tuition was beyond her limited resources, she was not able to continue. Right now she is the Centre's Administrative Assistant. She is being encouraged and couched to take the Government's Joint Admission and Matriculation exam in order to secure admission into a more affordable although competitive university. She is also being couched to save a portion of her salary for school tuition and materials. Hopefully, Inwelle Centre would be able to augment her school tuition and necessities while she works with the Centre and goes to a higher institution. In January 2009, the Centre also employed Miss Stella Umeh, an orphan who excelled in our computer Mass Literacy Campaign training in August, 2008. She too is being couched to secure admission into a higher institution and would be assisted to pay for tuition and other necessities as she attends school. The two girls are so far the core of our proposed participatory learning project. We plan to teach them other aspects of computer skills that would equip them to lead that project when it starts by August, 2009.

Inwelle Second Annual Symposium Theme: Youth Education and Democracy, December 18, 2008

Ou December 18, 2008, we held a symposium on

Youths Education and Democracy. The attendance was 80% young girls. Two males presented on youths in general while three females, Mrs. Ifeoma Gbulie, a seasoned retired educationist, Dr. Mrs. Josephine Nebedum, a university professor, and Barrister Mrs. Margaret Nwagbo, the Chairperson FIDA in Anambra State presented papers focused on female issues. Mrs. Gbulie's paper focused on the predicament of girls who fail to get education. Dr. Mrs. Nnebedum, in her paper, urged young girls to dream dreams in other to have direction and to be achievers. Barrister Mrs. Nwagbo educated the audience on the rights of girls and the law prohibiting the exploitation of girls, especially for those contracting marriages with under aged girls.

The Centre president, Professor Christiana Okechukwu, Ph.D., capturing the theme for the symposium in her opening statement, remarks: "The cost of youth crime is immense. For a democracy to be meaningful, indigent youths' plight must be addressed. Indigent youths in the rural areas roam about and are exposed to robbery, gangs, or sexual exploitation. Parents in these rural communities watch helplessly as their children go to prison or even die as a result of trying to procure abortion. The cost of youth crime is immense. A society that ignores the plight of restless and restive youths is sitting on a keg of gun powder. The poor youths' nefarious activities are costly for the youths, their victims, and the system. The earlier youth poverty is tackled, the better to avoid their growing up not only as unemployable adults but adults that will sometimes impede the democratic process.


For democracy to be effective, therefore, as potential leaders and voters, youths must be given meaningful education that will ensure that they earn livable wages as well as be positioned to make the right choices and to lead effectively. I hope our symposium today will engage all of us vigorously enough to be participants in youth education for our democracy to be meaningful. I hope we have a fruitful symposium and discussion session."

The symposium attracted 140 people and five presenters. Mr. Ifeanyi Onah from the Ministry of Education Enugu presented on "The Youth and The Youthed: Towards a Literate Democratic Nigeria. According to Mr. Onah, " Some Nigerian Youths are the sharpening tools which made the blades that cut their destiny. Barr. Mrs. Magaret Nwagbo presented on "Duties and Responsibilities of a Child Under The Child's Right Act. She defines a child as "a person below the age of 18. The new act seeks to protect the rights of s child but the child has to respect his/her parents, the state, and the nation." She educated the audience on the rights of girls and the law prohibiting the exploitation of girls, especially for those contracting marriages with under aged girls.'

Dr. Levi Chinaka Nwodu from
Anambra State University, Igbariam, presented
on "The Role of the Media in Political Education, Youth Empowerment and Sustainable
Democracy." He asserted "Contemporary
Nigerian youths no doubt, are faced with lots of
economic, cultural, political and sundry problems. On the political front, the youths are far
from the mainstream politics. At best, the
youths are used to accomplish nefarious political agenda by greedy adult politicians who pay
the youths peanuts and dump them afterward.

Mr. Ifeanyi Onah: The Ministry of Education Enugu presented on "The Youth and The Youthed: Towards a Literate Democratic Nigeria.

Barr. Mrs. Magaret Nwagbo: Chairperson, International Federation of Women Lawyers, Anambra State Branch, Awka, presented on "Duties and Responsibilities of a Child Under The Child's Right Act.

Dr. Levi Nwodu's paper explores, through critical analysis, the place of youths in Nigeria's democratic governance and posits that the youths are used to execute anti democratic acts by the older generation of Nigerians. It further advocates for the inculcation of sound education (with emphasis on political education) on the youths as a potent way of empowering them to fathom and resist attempts to manipulate them for personal aggrandizement. The paper concludes with a number of recommendations on what the mass media organs in the country could do to help in empowering and mobilizing the youths for active participation in the democratic processes as well as democratic sustenance."

Responding to the presenters, Mrs. Gbulie, a seasoned educationist, focused on the predicament of girls who fail to get education while Dr. Mrs. Nnebedum, urged young girls to dream dreams in order to have direction and to be achievers.



Featuring Mrs. Ifeoma Gbulie: The Star Advisor of the year 2008

Mrs. Ifeoma Nkeiruka Gbulie, BA (Hons), PGDE, a retired Educator, Anambra State Education Commission. Awka, Nigeria is an administrator, and a public servant. She was the principal of G.S.S Abagana, Anambra State from 1974 to 1980, Queens' School, Enugu, Enugu State, from 1984 to 1991. As an administrator, she was the Chairperson of Board of Anambra State Commission for Women, from 1991 to 1992, the Executive Secretary of Anambra State Commission for Women, from 1994 to 1997, Director of Administration, Anambra State Education Commission from 1997 to 1999, and Member, Anambra State Education Commission, 1999 -2003.

 \mathcal{I}_{α} her presentation during the Inwelle annual symposium held on December 18, 2008, Mrs. Gbulie pleaded with commissioners of Education in the eastern states to pay serious attention to youths' education because education is the bedrock of every society that hopes to thrive. According to her, education in the 21st century is a whole new ball game. She empathized with the youths and their plights given what had happened to education in the eastern states. Mrs. Gbulie insisted that parents in her generation focused strongly on the education of their children because of the power of education to mould better human beings. She attributed the loss of zeal in learning among the youths in eastern states to the fact that schools are collapsing. "If you put children in a rough environment," she said, "the children become rough."

Wre. Gbulie enjoined the government to do everything in its power to ensure that those children who, against all odds, were able to get a university education must get a job to prevent their being restless and restive and become tools for thug recruiters. She further stated that as a result of poor conditions in public schools parents have resorted to sending their children to private schools. The fall out then becomes a beautiful result from some institutions that have embraced cheating as their value for achieving results. As for the teachers,



she emphasized that because the society had stuck to the idea that the teachers' reward was in heaven, the classrooms were filled with teachers devoid of motivation and that basing promotion of such teachers on results of students had given rise to organized cheating. In a system where values had gone this haywire, she lamented, educated people were relegated to

the background while illiterate money bags were given the pride of place to address audiences on many occasions. She wondered how useful such people would be, given that they have money but have nothing useful to say to the society. However, she implored the teachers to be dedicated as those who work in the Lord's vineyard God waters their garden for them.


She further emphasized the need for the society to help the children find their ways and become useful members of the society. According to Mrs. Gbulie, the United Nations observes the International Day of the African Child precisely for that reason. "If we do nothing at the growing period of the youths," she warned, "we are digging a grave for the society." She advised the youths in these words: "Parents feel sad when youths are used as thugs. A real educated youth that has found himself and is properly engaged would shun nefarious activities. A simple test to be employed is any time politicians offers you money for thuggery, check if their children are among you people. If you indulge in killing, even if you are not caught, it will smear your hand and will follow you for life. In order to be part of sustainable development for the society, if you know that something is bad, do not do it."

Wirs. Gbulie also warned of the danger imminent in the society in which more girls are becoming more educated that the boys in the following words: "This is a dangerous situation because if the boys are not educated, the girls will be forced to marry semi-illiterates who become a danger to marriages because they will seek to control and this will bring instability in the homes."
